Four men arrested after burglary

People living in Bradley Stoke are being warned of thieves targeting homes to steal gold jewellery.

We have arrested four men as part of our enquiries into one recent burglary in which cash and jewellery were taken while the householder was out for just 30 minutes.

Four men remain on police bail pending further enquiries in connection with this burglary. Two were arrested in Patchway on the same day, and two others in Aylesbury the next day.

Neighbourhood teams have been carrying out high visibility patrols of the area to deter burglars and give crime prevention advice to householders.

PC Steve Palmer said: "Please call us if you see anyone acting suspiciously in your area. Try to give us descriptions of people and registration numbers of vehicles."

- Store jewellery in a safe which meets 'Sold Secure' standards
- Take photos, showing any unique or identifiable features and with a ruler in shot for scale
- Write a brief description of the items
- Keep the photos and descriptions somewhere safe, separate from the jewellery
- Mark items with a commercial forensic property marking system – they're invisible to the naked eye but show up under UV light

Did you know, we have specialist teams who:


- Work jointly with nurses and independent sexual violence advisors to support victims and investigate rape and serious sexual assault

Your Police & Crime Plan

The Commissioner has committed to introduce a Police & Crime Plan for each of the six policing districts of Avon and Somerset. Each Plan will address the policing and community safety needs of the area.

Sue Mountstevens has been on the road visiting South Gloucestershire to get residents' local policing priorities. She has been to Patchway and Filton chatting to residents and hearing their views. Nearly 2000 people have given their policing priorities either on-line or face-to-face and the Police & Crime Plan for South Gloucestershire will be published on April 1.

Sue Mountstevens said: "I believe everyone has the right to be safe and feel safe in their community and I have pledged to tackle anti-social behaviour, burglary, violence against women and girls and to listen to victims. The Police & Crime Plan will also reflect the communities' views and tackle your local area's priorities."





United against Anti-Social Behaviour

We know that anti-social behaviour like vandalism, rowdiness and noise can affect your quality of life, so we're committed to working with you and other agencies to make things better.

What is ASB?

It's any sort of issue causing harassment, alarm or distress. It can include crimes like damage, drunken rowdiness or arson. Some issues are not criminal offences and can be dealt with by the council, such as noisy neighbours and littering.

What can I do about it?

- Report it to your neighbourhood police team, local council or housing provider
- Keep a record of ongoing incidents including times, dates, locations and names or descriptions of those responsible. You can print an incident log template from our website.
- Help us identify who is behind ASB and secure the evidence we need to take action

The police, councils and housing providers all have different powers to tackle different problems. That's why we work together, to try deal with issues properly.

Targeting criminals thanks to you

Information from local communities is vital in helping us identify people responsible for criminal or anti-social behaviour.

Neighbourhood Sergeant Adrian Fallows said: "You can tell us your suspicions by talking to the neighbourhood team on 101. We always take your information seriously, but it may take some time for us to build up the evidence we need to take action."

- We arrested a man in December after seizing 26 suspected cannabis plants from the bedroom of a house in Bradley Stoke.
 A 24-year-old man is on police bail with conditions not to enter Bristol or South Gloucestershire pending forensic tests.
- We arrested two men after a burglary in Frenchay in January. Thieves broke into the
 house by forcing the gate and the pet flap and stole jewellery before making off in a car.
 A man matching the description of one of the suspects was arrested in Downend early
 the next morning along with a second man.

A 24-year-old man remains on police bail pending further enquiries while the other man was released without charge.

Speed Watch

Community Speed Watch volunteers in Hortham have caught 29 people breaking the speed limit in just three months.

The highest speed recorded was 59mph in a 30mph zone.

A new scheme is being set up in Pilning after speed was raised as an issue. In the meantime the mobile safety camera has been used in the village.

Community Speed Watch volunteers are specially-trained to use speed monitoring equipment safely.

They give details of any speeding vehicles to police who write a warning letter to the registered keeper.

Stolen caravan recovered

We recovered a caravan on the same day that it was stolen from the owner's drive in Bristol.

Officers spotted one matching the description being towed at the Hambrook lights and it was stopped by police in Winterbourne.

Two men were arrested for theft and later released on police bail pending further enquiries.

Log your gadgets

We're urging everyone to register their new gadgets and electrical items on the national property database www.immobilise.com

Recently we teamed up with Tesco stores across Avon and Somerset in a campaign to give out information to all their electrical customers and encourage people to register their new goods with *Immobilise*.

Anyone who signs up to *Immobilise* has a much greater chance of getting their property back if it's ever stolen or lost.

It makes it harder for thieves to sell on the property, because it can be identified, and that helps us to detect crimes like burglary.
